


Newsflash: Have you Heard!

Pastoral Pondering

In the gospel story we have today from Mark, we see a very significant part of Jesus: his love and concern for those on the fringes of society, and of those whom others would choose not to write off as unworthy of one's time and attention. In Jesus' day, one of those groups of persons were identified as those afflicted with leprosy. A highly contagious disease, we heard in our first reading from Leviticus that they were to wear rags and isolate themselves from others by crying out unclean and living outside the camp. They were basically left alone to die without the comforts of family or religion. The rationale was to quarantine the individuals so that their disease would not spread to others in the community. This may have been a necessary preventative measure 2,000 years ago when the Jewish Nation was struggling for survival amidst other religions and in a Roman Empire that did not like any one group upsetting the balance of peace and order created by Rome. And Jesus knows this. He also knows he has the power to do something about this isolating disease and to help this leper to be restored to full membership in society. That's why Jesus, noticing the man's faith that Jesus could indeed effect the cure, asks him boldly to do what no one else would have dreamt of doing. And Jesus chooses to honor the man's request and he is made clean! The question we have to ask though is, how did this leper even get into contact with Jesus if he was living outside the camp? The answer: Jesus most likely was walking outside the camp for just such an encounter! Jesus most likely knew they needed him the most! Who are the lepers in our day? Who is Jesus asking you to contact and to enter into relationship with? A pastoral pondering as we continue our journey in this 6th Week of Ordinary Time.

February Overview

The month of February is dedicated to the **Holy Family**. This year the first thirteen days of February fall during the liturgical season known as **Ordinary Time** which is represented by the liturgical color green. Green, the symbol of hope, is the color of the sprouting seed and arouses in the faithful the hope of reaping the eternal harvest of heaven, especially the hope of a glorious resurrection. The remaining days of February are the beginning of **Lent**. The liturgical color changes to purple — a symbol of penance, mortification and the sorrow of a contrite heart.
