True humility frees us to be our true selves as God sees us:

What is true humility and why should we make it a characteristic mark of our life and action? True humility is not feeling bad about us, or having a low opinion of ourselves, or thinking of ourselves as inferior to others. True humility frees us from preoccupation with ourselves, whereas a low self-opinion tends to focus our attention on ourselves.

Humility is truth in self-understanding and truth in action. A humble person makes a realistic assessment of himself or herself without illusion or pretense to be something he or she is not. The humble regard themselves neither smaller nor larger than they truly are.

True humility frees us to be our true selves and to avoid despair and pride. A humble person does not have to wear a mask or put on a facade to look good to others, especially to those who are not familiar with that person. The humble are not swayed by accidentals, such as fame, reputation, success or failure.
