

THE BEATITUDES - Interesting to note

- The word blessed which is used in each of the beatitudes is a very special word. It is the Greek word Makarios. It is the word which specially describes the gods. In Christianity there is a godlike joy. (Source from William Barclay's commentary)
- The Beatitudes (from Latin beatitudo, meaning "blessed" or "happy") are a list of traits that <u>Christians</u> should follow told by <u>Gospel of Matthew</u> and <u>Gospel of Luke</u>. Some of these include <u>humbleness</u>, <u>meekness</u>, and making <u>peace</u>. <u>Jesus Christ</u> taught these ideas as part of a three lesson sermon; the <u>Sermon on the Mount</u>.
- The **greatness of the beatitudes** is that they are not wistful glimpses of some future beauty; they are not even golden promises of some distant glory; they are triumphant shouts of bliss for a permanent joy that nothing in the world can ever take away.
- The **Church of the Beatitudes** on the shore of the Sea of Galilee marks the spot where Jesus is believed to have preached his Sermon on the Mount laying out core teachings including the Lord's Prayer and his call to "turn the other cheek".
- We need to build up society in the light of the Beatitudes, walking towards the Kingdom with the least among us.—Pope Francis.
